Congregational Meeting Minutes February 11, 2018

The meeting was called to order by Council President, Frank Rudy. A quorum was established, with 40 members present. Pastor Cindy White offered an opening prayer.

Council members and church staff were introduced.

Staff: Parish Administrator – Melody Gensure, Treasurer – Dave Gensure, Financial Secretary, Ann Marie Hadesty, Parish Musician – Sandra Mehalko and Pastor- Cindy White

Secretary's Report: The minutes of the February, April, and December Congregational minutes were approved on the motion of Sandy Mehalko, seconded by Paul Fegley.

Financial Reports: The Treasurer's, Financial Secretary's, Endowment and Audit Reports were reviewed and accepted on the motion of Rochelle Evanousky, seconded by Walter Weston.

The 2017 Audit Committee was named as Steve Ristila, Lori Krell, Walter Weston and Marilyn Leipold.

Committee Reports:

Property – Mark Valentine shared that many projects have been completed and a new electrical service will be completed in February.

Worship and Music – Sandy Mehalko thanked all of the lectors and cantors and was especially pleased to note that we have several young lectors and cantors.

Capital Campaign – Dave Fetterman stated that the Capital Campaign is going very well, but we still have a long way to go. Capital Campaign is hoping to repay one half of the loan from our Endowment Fund by the end of the first year of the campaign.

Communications - George Taylor stated that one of our goals for 2018 should be to reach out to members that we don't see regularly.

All other reports were reviewed and accepted on the motion of Paul Fegley, seconded by Bob Jones.

State of the Congregation:

A Zion Ministries and Activities Table, created by Dave Fetterman, shows that we have many activities going on in the church, especially through Outreach; work completed by Property has saved Zion thousands of dollars; and Culinary continues to provide generous funds to the church as a result of their work.

It was noted that we have had a slight increase in attendance in 2017 and we are looking to continue that trend. Paul Pecha had a question concerning the Giving Step Report. After discussion, it was determined that amended copy of the report needs to be provided.

Council President, Frank Rudy believes that we have taken a huge step forward, with the hiring of a full time pastor and the start of a Capital Campaign and we need to use these as stepping-stones for continued growth. Pastor Cindy White expressed her gratitude to everyone for their support for her completion of seminary, her Ordination, and her first year at Zion. She also spoke about her goals for 2018, which include:

1. Establishing a Mutual Ministry Committee
2. Working with Shirley Tirpak to continue to grow Christian Education programs
3. Completing a new pictorial directory
4. Attempting to contact/visit all current members

5. She also explained that for the time being Evangelism is being done through Outreach, and Stewardship will be done with and through the Finance and Capital Campaign Committees.

The meeting was adjourned on the motion of Mark Valentine, seconded by Bob Jones and closed with prayer.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT 2018

PROPERTY COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 2018

A committed group of people have been working throughout the year to maintain and improve the facilities at Zion. We are blessed with people who give of their time and talents to ensure the safety and comfort of those attending worship and other events at Zion.

We thank our sexton Kim Eckert and our cleaning angels. For those unfamiliar with the cleaning angels, these are volunteers who each week give the Sanctuary, Gathering Room and Library a thorough cleaning. We are always looking for addition angels so here is an excellent way for a Zion member to serve the church.

Ron Dietrich and Rick Bachman oversee the maintenance of the cemetery. Rick is cemetery secretary. Help is always appreciated during spring clean-up and summer mowing and trimmings.

GOALS FOR 2018

- Develop and update an annual maintenance schedule – Ongoing
- Replace spotlights in altar window - Completed
- Continue wall restoration work where and when needed – Greenwood
- Work on middle Mauch Chunk Street doors – Completed
- Replace basement lights with LEDs - Completed
- Replace thermostats – in progress

GOAL FOR 2019

- Develop and update an annual maintenance schedule – Ongoing
- Review and update property files in parish office
- Update (and perhaps digitize) cemetery records
- Complete thermostat replacements
- Continue wall restoration work where and when needed
- Replace failing window insulating material
- Review lighting options in stairwells
- Recruit additional cleaning angels Freshen front vestibule

EXTERIOR

Installed corner door handrail on right side.

Installed signs at main entrances directing people to the handicapped entrance.

Completed new electric service in February.

Reviewed estimates and designs for a digital corner sign but because Zion is in a historical district, variances would be needed to proceed with such a project.

Redirected downspouts on Greenwood near the handicapped entrance to the sidewalks due to clogged pipes underground.

Addressed sticking doors and locking issues and ekeyed all entrance doors.

Installed new security camera so that the Parish Administrator can see who is at the door when the doorbell rings.

Inspected the chime tower which has been determined to be the source of much of the water issues evident in the upper Mauch Chunk interior. Roofer Jeff Hinkle has done a great deal of work to temporarily deal with the leaking issues. Mark Valentine took a group of council members on a tour of the roof and chime tower. The group's thinking is that the chime tower ought to be the next phase of the exterior

restoration at an estimated cost of \$188,000. An estimate has also been requested to replace the chicken wire inserts installed in the openings of both towers with a solid panel with louvers.

Replaced the exhaust fan in the chime tower.

Repaired leak in Gathering Room skylight.

Repaired holes in Gathering Room rubber roof most likely caused by fireworks landing on the roof causing some charring.

INTERIOR

Inspected and repaired all emergency lights with the aid of Ed Weston.

Switched Internet provider from Verizon DSL to Service Electric which improves our upload speed for our worship service streaming.

Converted all ceiling lighting in the basement to LED bulbs which provides greater illumination at a lower cost. Bob and Gail Jones helped cover the cost of the conversion in the Social Hall.

Repaired and painted the high altar walls.

Replaced high altar lighting with LEDs. Dimmer switches installed.

Painted the Pastor's office.

Repaired and painted the stairwell beside the organ.

Repaired water damage in the choir room.

Repaired water damage in the Pastor's former office.

Repaired water damage in the Sunday school supt.'s office.

Inspected boiler valves and thermostats. Thermostats will be replaced this year.

Replaced the grinder/pump in the Social Hall handicapped bathroom.

Replaced two trash receptacles in Fellowship Hall.

Purchased a DVD player and installed it in the AV rack in Fellowship Hall.

Replaced the boiler motor.

Considered a proposal for lighting the Mauch Chunk Street sanctuary window. Cost: \$3,124

Removed mens room ceiling tiles due to water damage.

Purchased a back-up wireless microphone for the Pastor.

Purchased a wireless unit with two microphones for use downstairs. The unit can also be plugged into the sanctuary sound system to add mics when needed.

Received a used mini-frig from a member replace the unit used to store communion wine.

CEMETERY

Mowing and trimming continue to be done by Ron Dietrich and Rick Bachman. An exceptionally rainy summer required more cutting and trimming than usual.

Patched and sealed the road inside the cemetery.

Worked on toppled and leaning tomb stones .

Reviewed and updated cemetery rules last revised in 1993

SECURITY

Pastor White, Bob Maue and Rick Bachman attended an active shooter workshop at Trinity UCC. George Taylor attended a similar workshop at Zion Stone Church.

Safety guidelines have been developed and discussed by council.

Responding to an active shooter will be addressed by a guest speaker at the 2019 annual meeting.

Concerns: Zion entryways are not secure during church events. The current practice of locking the Mauch Chunk corner door at 9:15 a.m. while it remains unmonitored for 1:15 hours does not provide security. Current practice of having upper Mauch Chunk Street door unlocked but not monitored during the

service does not provide security. Need to have greeters stationed at all entryways to welcome and observe—otherwise the entryways are not secure.

OTHER ISSUES

Nothing outside Zion again this year said “It’s Christmas!” Suggestion: Using the 3 wreaths we have in the attic somewhere outside other than over the doors. Suggestion: An exterior nativity scene similar to the one a St. John XXIII used to have – but that would involve someone building a secure enclosure for the figures.

Zion may become the sole host for Tamaqua HS baccalaureate services. We will need to be more proactive about setting up additional seats for the event.

Concern has been expressed that the Girl Scout groups using the church do not have facility use guidelines to follow.

Facility use have note always been followed. A facility use form is to be completed by anyone using the church. Council could reinforce the importance of the facility use form being completed and returned to the Parish Administrator BEFORE final approval is given to use the church.

Facility use guidelines were reviewed and remain unchanged. Council must be aware the rental fees are not to be waved as per the guidelines. While we would like to see our building used more and we would like to serve the community, waiving fees for an outside organization while members must pay has created some concerns.

Kitchen inspection issues have been addressed. When the inspection notice arrives in December or January, it will go to Council which will direct it to Culinary for action and avoid the last-minute rush to ready the kitchen for inspection.

Cleaning Angels are needed. Several teams that have been cleaning for several years have retired. New teams are needed. The more teams available, the fewer times each team must clean.

ENDOWMENT FUND 2018 REPORT



We would like to thank everyone for their support for our Endowment fund this past year. Unfortunately, our results for 2018 was a loss of (\$15,856) or (3.7%). The past two years had good gain \$43,572 or 12.6% for 2017 and +\$22,082 or 6.60% for 2016. Comparing our losses with the general market's loss of between 8 to 10 %, I feel that we averaged out better than most investors did.

One of the good points for last year, was that the Capital campaign paid back their original loan of \$128,000 completing our first phase of our exterior restoration.

The fund acts as a back up to supplement the ongoing needs to maintain our church. Past projects included replacing the heating system and next was the total roof replacement. Annual payback for 2018 was \$16,173 and helps pay for the churches insurance policy.

We started the fund in mid 2000 and our giving back to the church since start is \$298,542. Our ending balance was \$401,798.

Our committee include Walter Weston, Bob Jones, Rochelle Evanousky and Steve Ristila.

Zion Finance Committee Report 2018

Robert Jones, Chairperson; Steven Ristila, Vice-Chair and Recording Secretary; Dave Gensure, Treasurer; Ann Marie Hadesty, Financial Secretary; George Taylor; Walter Weston; Rochelle Evanousky; and Council Member Sam Caley serve on Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church Finance Committee. We welcome Matthew Warden who came on board at the end of the year.

This past year was another one with no shortage of challenges. We found that in order to reach out to the community by broadcasting our services live with Boxcast we needed better Internet Service so we had to switch from Verizon to Service Electric at additional cost. The cost of Boxcast was covered for the year by a donation.

Property came to Finance with a proposal to replace the lighting fixtures in the two rooms downstairs with LED lights, the advantage being that it may cut electric usage in half. The cost would be around \$2,000. The request was approved and a donation was received to cover this expense.

One of the biggest challenges we have to deal with every year is the budget. We began working on the 2019 budget in September and it didn't take long to see some categories would need a substantial increase. Following Synod guidelines the Pastor's salary was raised by \$1,031 to \$35,403. Finance approved a 3% increase in salaries for Lay Staff so consequently both Employer Share Taxes and Workman's Comp had to be increased.

Bulletins were budgeted at \$100 last year but actual expense as of September was \$709 due to the large number of Church funerals this past year.

A new Budget line, Webcast, was inserted into the budget at a cost of \$2,000.

Pastor anticipates a Stewardship program for the next year so \$700 is in the budget to cover that expense.

Because income continues to lag behind actual expenses we were unable to submit a balanced budget to Council.

We ended 2018 with a budget deficit of almost \$30,000.

I don't know how the Church could survive without the "gifts" or income from the following organizations.

The Endowment Fund gave the Church \$16,173 to pay the annual insurance premium. Thanks to that committee for managing the Church's assets.

The Culinary Crew worked very hard again this year and turned \$18,085 over to the Church, an increase of over \$2,435 from last years contribution of \$15,650. We thank the Culinary Crew for all their dedication and hard work.

Another source that is overlooked and must be acknowledged is Thrivent. Many of our members have savings invested with this organization. All qualified members are eligible to apply for 2 Thrivent Action Team Projects per year. Thrivent gives a \$250 "Community Impact Card" which is a VISA card which may be used as seed money to purchase supplies. Both Culinary and Property have had Action Teams this past year to work on various projects and socials. In addition Thrivent also has what is called "Choice Dollars". Eligible members can designate where Thrivent distributes a portion of its charitable money. The amount a person receives is based on their insurance premiums and contract values. As a result of this program Zion received \$1,479 last year. We thank all of our Thrivent members for what they have done to help the Church throughout the past year.

So if you add up the \$18,085 from Culinary and \$1,479 from Thrivent you have \$19,564. Consider that pays the electricity, phone, maintenance and water, sewer and refuse!

We have a hard working, dedicated Finance Team and I thank everyone for all the effort they put into our work this past year. I especially want to thank both Dave and Ann Marie for the exceptional work they do. The Capital Campaign has put additional responsibilities on the both of them and they have handled it well.

Our Parish Administrator, Melody, while not a member of the Finance Committee is an integral part of the team. She assists me when I need information and I frequently ask her for favors. She prepares copies of the agenda, minutes and reports for every meeting. So I thank you for all your help and hard work.

OUTREACH 2018

Several years ago when Zion's by-laws were revised, several ministries were brought together under the same umbrella because their missions shared some similarities. Hence, 'Outreach' has characteristics of congregational care, community outreach and evangelism. Ministries under the Outreach umbrella include the blanket ministry, Care Corps, Christmas and July food baskets, Culinary, the cradle roll, the Diaper Depot diaper pantry and flower ministries, the Goods 'N Stuff rummage sale, Joyful Noise, the Prayer Chain, the prayer shawl ministry and World/community mission.

2019 HIGHLIGHTS

- 200 served at New Year's Day dinner
- Over \$1,400 collected for Joyful Noise distribution
- Souper Sunday soup donations result in giving food items to families with needs and to Primitive Methodist's food bank which serves over 110 families each month
- Prayer Chain continues to handle numerous requests
- In addition to its numerous socials and food sales, Culinary hosts a free New Year's Day pork and sauerkraut dinner and provides light lunches for fellowship time following the fourth Saturday service of each month except November and December.
- Culinary served a turkey dinner following the well-attended "Christmas in July" Saturday service
- Zion had a presence at both the downtown Summerfest and fall Heritage Day as members sold pretzels and handed out fliers promoting church events. Proceeds from two Goods N Stuff rummage sales are split 50/50 with the current fund of the church. Outreach uses its 50 percent to fund its various projects, activities and donations. All items that are left over from the rummage sale go to veterans organizations and homeless shelters in surrounding areas. Zion has also donated gloves, scarfs, hats and coats to Hope & Coffee here in town.
- Our Easter egg hunt, Trunk or Treat and A Charlie Brown Christmas events entertained and provided fellowship to many area families
- Our July picnic basket project served 20 families.
- We affirmed our partnership with the Greater Philadelphia Diaper Bank with a \$500 donation part of which came from a Joyful Noise collection.
- We continue our support of Schuylkill Women in Crisis with a \$300 donation. □ Zion hosted the 8th annual Tamaqua Advent Breakfast with 192 tickets sold □ Christmas food bags were given to 20 families.
- Christmas cards with a Christmas Eve service schedule sent to all Zion members

KIVA

We continue our support of KIVA, a world-wide outreach that helps people by lending money to help start-up businesses buy goods for resale, plant plants for food, purchase fishing equipment and educational items for teaching, and provide water for communities, among other activities. Through KIVA, we lend money and get paid back so we can lend the money again. We lend \$ 25 each time. Along with other lenders, we become a unit of funding. We have made a total of 48 loans to individuals in 28 countries. We had a few defaults this year because of their location and deaths.

BIRTHRIGHT

Birthright in Frackville provides information to pregnant women on childbirth, prenatal development and care for their babies. Zion is a part of the Giving Tree giving supplies such as creams, clothes, powder, Q-tips diapers wash clothes and towels. We also collect items for the babies all through the year along with blankets made by Gwen Evans and ladies from the surrounding areas we are able to help Birthright fill their needs.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

As a project Zion's vacation bible school, children made projects to fill Sanitarian's Purse boxes along with additional items from Zion's church family. We sent 37 boxes this year, partnering with Faith Assembly Church in Hazleton. The

shoeboxes deliver gifts to children who may never receive a gift or hear about Jesus. It gives missionaries a chance to deliver the message of Jesus Christ.

DIAPER DEPOT PANTRY

For several years, Zion has received diapers from the Greater Philadelphia Diaper Bank without a formal distribution program in place. This year, we initiated Diaper Depot, a organized diaper distribution pantry program to meet an important health need in our community. Tamaqua Area School District families can request free diapers once a month. In addition to diapers, a container of baby wipes is given with each request. We started with 19 requests in October and as of January, requests are coming from 50 families. Several Zion members have embraced the pantry as their ministry. They assemble requests the evening before distribution. A few handle the distribution the next morning. Donations of diapers and money are welcome.

HELPING HAND DAY

THRIFT STORE

We are continuing a discussion about opening a Zion Thrift Store either in the church or at a downtown location as an alternative (or in addition) to our twice-a-year rummage sale using the Thrift Store at Trinity Lutheran in Lehighton as a model. Several good reasons come to mind. (1) It is a need in this community. (2) It is an excellent way for Zion to both serve the community and be more visible in the community. (3) It can provide a ministry opportunity for Zion members who current do not have one. (4) It can generate income. (Trinity Lutheran in Lehighton has a Thrift Store that generates \$30,000 to 40,000 a year which goes to the food pantry it also operates.) Initially, we could seek a partner willing to let us operate the store rent-free until we see if it can fly on its own. The key to this project, however, is not only the location but rather the involvement of Zion members who are not already involved in ministries.

COMMUNITY NEEDS

A summer luncheon program expanding the South Ward playground to Dutch Hill

A community cancer support group

A community care giver support group

A community parenting support group

A MOMS Club

A community grief support group

A community marriage recovery group

A community divorce support group Community youth activities

A Common Grounds worship service for recovering individuals and their families

Can we do all of this? Of course not, but the opportunities are there for Zion to have real impact on the community.

This is above and beyond what we might do as an organization and is in fact what Jesus is calling each of us to do. “‘For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.’ Then the righteous will answer him, ‘Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you something to drink? When did we see you a stranger and invite you in, or needing clothes and clothe you? When did we see you sick or in prison and go to visit you?’” “The King will reply, ‘Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.’” (Matthew 25:35-40)

We welcome increased support from our congregation at our socials and other events. In addition to attending Zion events, members can help by distributing posters and sign-up sheets and collecting orders where they live or work. If you cannot attend a social, a contribution toward event expenses would be most helpful.

2018 Capital Campaign Committee Annual Report

Zion's Capital Campaign (CC) Committee currently consists of eight members: Pastor Cindy, Sandy Mehalko, George Taylor, Bob and Gail Jones, Frank Rudy and Darlene and Dave Fetterman. The committee, which meets monthly, began its works in April, 2017. We remain interested in having new members. Anyone interested in serving on the committee is asked to contact Dave. Committee members may include individuals who are not members of Zion.

The following is a list of action steps the committee completed this past year:

1. In the first two quarters of 2018 the committee continued to work with Mary Mack, consultant, who was contracted to conduct research and complete applications to foundations that award grants to churches and historic sites. During this time, the Capital Campaign Committee learned that Zion had not qualified for previously submitted grant applications from either the John E. Morgan Foundation or The Fund for Sacred Places.
2. We applied for several other grants and one grant twice, but were informed we either did not qualify or the grantor did not give funds for church building renovations.
3. The committee learned most foundations want their grantees (e.g., churches) to run programs for the community such as day care, latch key or senior-related service programs. Programs are typically measured by their impact on the surrounding area (community). Also, the committee learned grants are available for starting church-sponsored community programs, but it was decided to ask Mary to suspend her work in applying for grants at this time.
4. The committee considered directly soliciting donations from local businesses. In preparation for this effort, the committee had enlisted the support of seven additional Zion members to help raise funds (i.e., ask for money). The committee felt that those who agreed to ask businesses for money would need training. Several sources that provided training were identified, including Kirby-Smith Associates.
5. In conjunction with the Capital Campaign Committee's belief that professional training was needed for Zion volunteers and the committee's unsuccessful application to private foundations and state grants for funding, (and exhausting all other known alternatives for raising funds), it was decided to explore the feasibility of contracting with a fundraising consulting firm to help provide training and possibly raise additional funds.
6. On 10/25, Gene Musser, President/CEO and Jim Edwards, Vice-President, Kirby-Smith Associates (KSA), delivered a presentation of their services to Capital Campaign Committee and Zion Church Council members (not all committee or council members were able to attend the presentation). A proposal for services and deliverables was provided to each meeting participant in a fullcolored booklet. KSA indicated they could provide training to Zion members to raise funds. However, based on their experience, KSA opined it was likely that area business owners supported their own churches and therefore, direct solicitation of businesses owners would likely not be productive or an effective use of time.
7. A written summary of the KSA presentation was provided to all Capital Campaign Committee and church council members and the Capital Campaign Committee subsequently voted to recommend to council that Zion contract with KSA for consulting services.
8. In early November and with the approval of Church Council, the committee reached an agreement with KSA to obtain consultant services for Zion's fundraising efforts to restore the exterior of the church. A copy of KSA's brochure describing its services is available to Zion members for review in the church office. The \$10,000.00 contractual agreement includes consultant services provided by Jim Edwards for a six-month period. Zion received a generous donation of \$1,000.00 each from two Zion members towards the payment of the consultant's fee.

9. In the first two campaign planning meetings, Jim provided the committee with a six-month campaign timeline, including action steps planned for completion by the committee before the end of 2018:
 - Visits by Jim with church council and finance committee members
 - Review of Zion members' current pledges and contributions
 - Establishment of sub-committees and assignment of chairs to support the campaign effort
 - Scheduled personal meetings with major donors
 - Final draft of the Zion Faith Promise Card
 - Final draft of revised Zion Capital Campaign Brochure
 - Final draft of revised Zion Pledge Form
 - Final draft of Pastor's letter that will be mailed to select Zion members inviting them to Leadership receptions on 1/12 & 1/13/19
 - Scheduled training on 1/10 or 1/11/19 for church volunteers that will participate in follow-up calls to Zion members unable to attend the receptions.
10. The committee developed and sent a fund raising letter to all former Zion members for which it had addresses.
11. The committee continues to collaborate with Ann Marie Hadesty and Dave Gensure to track and report committee fundraising expenses, payments and balances. Also tracked and reported are the names of contributors to the campaign including: Zion members, non-members, and organizations, and the number of pledges and gifts and their amounts.
12. Sandy Mehalko volunteered to work with Ann Marie to run monthly fund raising reports and continue to coordinate the engraving of names on the Giving Tree leaves with Delrose Awards, Lansford. Development of a quarterly report to help track donor contributions will be explored.
13. Thank You letters are routinely sent to members and non-members acknowledging pledges and gifts of \$ 1,000.00 or more for ten years or less. Donors are reminded their donations are tax deductible.
14. A list of Zion Ministries and Activities (attached) continues to be updated on an ongoing basis by Dave Fetterman. The list is periodically sent to church council members and various church leaders and is available to others upon request.
15. On an ongoing basis, Kelsey Zamudio updates the campaign's thermometer displaying our fund raising progress in dollar amounts of pledges made and pledge and gift amounts received. Thank you Kelsey!
16. The committee provided input into the development of a brochure on 'Legacy Giving' for Zion members and non-members. The brochure was sent to the Finance Committee for its review and approval.
17. * As of October 31, 2018, the Capital Campaign received pledges totaling \$420,144.00 (61 Zion members pledged \$1,000.00 or more over 10 years or less. This figure also includes a \$5,000.00 gift to name a pew in honor of Pastor Cindy White). \$60,889.09 of that amount has been received. Additionally, \$51,333.92 has been received in gifts.
 - On 12/19/18, the committee reimbursed Zion's Endowment Fund the full amount of the loan borrowed to complete restoration of the Greenwood Street side of the church. The principle reimbursed was \$128,000.00 plus 2% interest, (\$3,555.88) for a grand total of \$131,555.88.
 - As of 1/5/19, the Capital Campaign account balance was \$14,432.78.
