ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MINUTES SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 2021

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the meeting was held via Zoom. President Chris Henritzy called the meeting to order. A quorum was established with 32 members in attendance. Pastor Cindy White opened with a prayer.

Welcome and Introduction of Church Council and Staff: Chris Henritzy-President, Michael Haspe-Vice President, Tiffany Warden-Secretary, Sam Caley, Arlene Derr, Glenn Fritzinger, Ernie Henritzy, Brenda Hill, Brian Lawfer, Bob Maue, Bonnie Painter, and Mary Ruth Taylor

Staff:

Secretary's Report: The minutes for the February and December 2020 Congregational meetings were approved on the motion of Sandy Mehalko, seconded by Glenn Fritzinger.

Reception of Financial Reports

Treasurer – Dave Gensure Financial Secretary – Ann Marie Hadesty Audit

All financial reports were reviewed and accepted on the motion of Darlene Fetterman, seconded by Mark Valentine.

Committee Reports:

Finance: Rochelle Evanousky reviewed the Financial Report. 2020 was certainly a challenge to say the very least. Most of the year was spent worshiping through Zoom services, but giving continued and the year ended with a surplus.

Endowment: Walter Weston reported a large plunge in our investments in March/April, but our totals recovered by years end with a total gain for the year of \$46,383. He also added the importance of Bequests as we had a rather large one, for the amount of \$84,835, which helped our parish gifts total this past year.

Capital Campaign: Dave Fetterman happily reported that the Capital Campaign had received \$65,458.00 from Zion member and non-members for 2020. This was an astonishing number, especially with the current times. The remaining balance for the current phase stands at \$102,200.00 which would be approximately a \$5,000/month income of donations to stay on track for the remainder of the repayment. Planning has also begun to apply for grants to help with future restoration projects. Pastor White has a friend that specializes in this area so she has been contacted to assist.

Property: Mark Valentine and his team worked tirelessly on many projects within the church, as they always do, to keep labor costs down where possible. A large project discussed in 2020 was that of the lighting overhaul to convert all lighting to LED for a more cost-efficient way to light the church. The work for this has started and will take several months to complete. Power consumption costs will be reduced by 83% after completion.

Outreach: George Taylor spoke of the many activities of 2020, despite the pandemic. Some of these activities included, but were not limited to Diaper Depot, People's Pantry, Blessings Thrift Store, and social media/phone streaming service. In the past year, Diaper Depot has helped more than 575 children with close to 27,000 diapers given out. People's Pantry continues to help families on a daily basis around the surrounding area. Another large area that played a critical role in 2020 was our social media through our website, Facebook page, and live-streamed services. With the majority of services and special events being streamed online this year it gave our congregation and non-members a chance to still be part of the church even when

we were unable to be all together. PhoneLiveStreaming.com was also introduced to allow anyone to hear our worship services and other messages on their phones without having to be connected to the internet. Culinary has again played an instrumental role in our church. Unfortunately, many events for 2020 had to be cancelled as a result of the pandemic, but they were able to start the year off with two successful community sauerkraut dinners, hoagie sale, and soup sale. They were also able to squeeze in an additional hoagie and apple pie sale.

Alter Guild: New members are always welcome.

Christian Education: Michael Haspe reported a successful, but challenging first year. Sunday School had a total enrollment of 22 children and was held virtually most of the year through pre-recorded lessons and Zoom. This method of teaching will continue until we can safely resume in person Sunday School. Confirmation included 5 students, but also had seen some challenges. Nonetheless class and learning continued with focus on Year B and New Testament Bible Study and 4 students are scheduled to be confirmed Pentecost 2021. There were no children registered for First Holy Communion classes this past year. Vacation Bible School was presented virtually by Michael and Pastor Cindy a.k.a. Sally Spruce with 30 pre-registered children. Each child received craft kits to complete nightly that tied into each night's theme. Other highlights prior to the shutdown were two successful "Family Film Nights" and a pierogi sale to benefit the Loaves & Fishes Youth Ministry. The largest goal for 2021 is the hope to return to all in person studies.

Worship and Music: Sandy Mehalko expressed such a drastic change to this past year's report as compared to previous years. After more than 40 years of reports, there is not much to share for this past year. The result of the pandemic left for an empty church with, at most, a handful of those on a Sunday morning as compared to years prior where the church was filled with songs, voices, and celebrations during services. She looks forward to a time when we are all able to worship together again.

All committee reports were reviewed and accepted on the motion of Judy Brennan, seconded by Art Connely.

VII. State of the Congregation

The Attendance report and Giving Step Report were reviewed and discussed.

President's 2020 Summary: Chris Henritzy began by expressing his gratitude for being selected to serve as Congregational Church Council President for the past year and for the leadership and knowledge from Frank Rudy and Darlene Fetterman. This past year brought frustrations and many difficult decisions to be made by the Executive Committee and Church Council. Decisions were made through a lot of prayer and research. He also thanked everyone for their cooperation and understanding during these difficult times.

President's 2021 Goals: Through faith, the most important goal of 2021 would be to return to live services. Aside from this, he prayerfully looks forward to 2021 in terms of the budget and financial challenges.

Pastor's Annual Report for 2021

It is hard to believe that we have now reached the two-year mark since the Virus first hit the world. Numbers continue to rise with the new Omicron variant to contend with.

Two out of the four 2021 goals were reached and continue to be worded on. We have begun to work on Sam Caley's Stewardship program by calling members that we haven't seen in church. Reconnecting and developing a person-to-person relationship with these families is our goal. This is specifically families that we did not see prior to Covid. This is in the hope that member will become involved in the activities and worship of church again.

The first Recovery church service will be on March the 1st 2022. This was not completed in 2021 due to health issues.

Council recommended postponing a church pictorial book until further notice.

I have not completed the process of writing a new mission statement.

It is significant to note that Synod had requested that I be Dillon Epler's supervisor through his internship at Saint John's Lutheran church here in Tamaqua. I am Saint John's designated pastor until they determine to call him to be their minister. This requires very little time on my part. I see Dillon every Monday for several hours as we attend a group with 7 other Lutheran pastors in our mission district. We discuss the next week's scripture for preaching purposes. Pastor Barto officiates for communion and Baptisms for Saint John's. I attend their council meeting once a month and see Dillon during my regular schedule on a Monday. This does not interfere with anything that I am called to do for Zion. Dillon will complete his internship in May of 2023.

I believe this has been a very good year for Zion. I am very happy that Zion is hosting a Narcotics anonymous meeting every Monday. It is going very well. We also had a fun and well attended vacation Bible school. Our Christian education and adult offering of study is continuing to grow. The blessings thrift store is a wonderful monthly addition to our ministry.

Diaper depot continues to do well and is a much needed ministry in our community. The culinary team is as busy as ever. Music ministry is (in my opinion) the very best in town. Our property committee is outstanding. Outreach committee, People's Pantry, Alter guild...........

I pray that people know that WE ARE BLESSED.

The only ministry that has decreased over the past two years is homebound visitation at the request of families and individuals. Our Eucharistic ministers with continue their call as needed and requested. Hospital visits and nursing home visits have only been interrupted at the facilities request. Covid has made many people reluctant to have someone come into their home. We honor the parishioner's requests.

My goals for 2022 are as follows.

- 1. Create a new mission statement (with the help of our writers in t he church)
- 2. Work toward a new pictorial book.
- 3. Continue with Stewardship plan.
- 4. Ensure we have a well established Miller Keystone presence here at Zion.

I continue to be amazed by the dedication of many of the members of Zion. God's work is evident here. It is my hope that every member here finds a way to be a part of this ministry.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT 2021

The Property Committee/Team is entrusted with the care and maintenance of the church building and property which includes the cemetery.

Property Committee: Mark Valentine, chair; Ron Dietrich; Rick Bachman; Bob Maue; Michael

Property work team: Mark Valentine; Bob Fisher; Mike Miller; Charlie Long; Ellsworth Davis; Skip Anderson; Andy Deitrich; Ron Dietrich; Rick Bachman; Joe Mehalko

Cleaning angels: Ron Dietrich; Lori Krell; Mary Ruth Taylor; Arlene Derr; Ernie and Susan Henritzy; Trudy Maue; Beth Lattanzi

Property tackled several major projects in 2021:

- Upper Mauch Chunk Street roof/scupper repair
- Sanctuary/Gathering room lighting update
- Kitchen fire suppression system update
- Boiler repair
- Greenwood Street roof repair

January

- Sanctuary lighting project begins when Sunday worship services move downstairs.
- Work on the Family Room renovations begin. Cabinets installed.

Shelving installed for People's Pantry storage.

February

- Sanctuary lighting project continues. LED bulbs installed in all fixtures. Old lighting control panel removed; new digital equipment installed.
- Annual kitchen inspect reveals need for fire suppression system over the stove.
- Damage to cemetery fence reported.

March

- Sanctuary lighting project nears completion. The LED lights are brighter and use 86% less electricity. The lights can be dimmed remotely with a phone app. In addition to the sanctuary lights, Mark Valentine updated many of the light switches in the main worship area and eliminated wiring no longer in use.
- The property team installed an ethernet cable from the office area to the lighting panel closet. The Internet is needed to remotely operate the light dimmers. Mark is installing cable to the upstairs and downstairs video streaming areas.

April

- Sanctuary lighting project is complete with the exception of some fine tuning. The final cost is expected to come in under the \$5,000 budget. Mark Valentine estimates he put in 100 hours on the project; he estimate the team put in another 100 hours. All total saving the church \$10,000.
- A new stainless-steel-top table has been purchased by Culinary and installed.
- With Blessings thrift occupying the gym area of the downstairs, George Taylor proposes using the worship area for Culinary events like dinners and socials. Round tables moved into that area give the Saturday service a more relaxed feel and allow for Culinary uses.
- Cleaning angels resume their duties.

May

- After a team cleans the deck of the bell tower and adjusting the bell ropes, Mark Valentine suggests that the tower entrance not be used on Sundays due to materials falling from the tower walls.
- Two LED lighting fixtures are installed to provide better lighting on the pulpit and lectern for wedcasts.

June

- A tractor-trailer damaged the upper corner fence. Ron Dietrich reported the damage to police. The trucking firm was contacted and eventually paid \$2,500 for the repairs.
- Borough workers damaged a fence corner on the lower side of the cemetery. The same contractor who fixed the upper fence repaired the lower fence at Tamaqua Borough's expense.
- J&K is installing the fire suppression unit. Culinary is paying for the installation.
- The new (used) oven with arrived Father's Day weekend along with the new table on which it will sit. The unit and table were donated by Sonia Brode.
- The boiler is need of repair due to water and smoke leaks. The cast-iron unit will be disassembled, cleaned and new gaskets and o-rings installed. The boiler was installed in 2005. The work should take about 4 weeks. The estimated cost is \$9,000.

July

- Culinary purchased a used refrigerator to provide extra space.
- Library/office air conditioning unit failed. A replacement proposal was reviewed but Chris Henritzy said replacement may have the wait to next year. Property did not support purchase of single units for the two affected areas.

August

- Ron Dietrich has announced his retirement from the cemetery work crew effective Oct. 1, 2021.
- Furnace work continues. Will be complete by start of heating season.

September

- Both Ron Dietrich and Rick Bachman are retiring from their roles at the cemetery.
- Mark expressed his frustration in being unable to identify the source of the water leaks that keeps damaging restored areas. Some discussion about having Roman examine the roof area above the Gebert Chapel which may require renting a lift.
- Michael Haspe is leading a team to paint the Family Room off the Gathering Room. The project will be done as part of God's Work, Our Hands Sunday.

October

- Drone roof inspection Jeff Bowers says he saw some potential issues in the roof area above the Gebert Chapel. Roman said he would bring the necessary gear to climb on the roof and examine the area more closely.
- Furnace was restarted Friday, Oct. 1. One of the sections of the boiler was damaged and had to be replaced at a cost of between \$3,200 and \$4,000 in addition to the estimated \$9,000 in boiler rebuilding.
- Our 20 fire extinguishers will need to be hydro-tested. Mark says J&K has a better prince than Kistler. Cost will be \$1,072 for testing and \$4 each (\$80) for inspection.

November

- Upper Mauch Chunk scupper drain Roman Project completed. Final bill to be paid perhaps from improvement funds. Total project: \$2,000 materials;
- Greenwood roof repair Roman has resolved many roof issues on the Greenwood side of the church due to less than adequate work back in 2009 when the new roof was installed.
- Furnace repair update/bill Project complete; bill sent but not received; Total is \$13,000;

December

- Michael Haspe and Judy Brennan restore the wreaths originally decorated by Alma Jean and Bob Fisher. Michael, Judy and Beth Marcavage put the wreaths in place.
- Greenwood roof repair update —payment under way for completed work. Mark viewed slides of current roof project. He expects Roman to return week of Dec. 13 to continue roof repair project which will now include area over damaged organ pipe control leather straps. Mark projects additional roof project could cost \$20,000.
- Endowment provides \$24,000 to pay for the furnace repairs and completed roof work.
- Smoke detector inspection completed. Mark said the people from ADT proposed installing updated system at a cost of \$4,500. New system would also have higher monitoring and inspection fees. Current monitoring: \$360; projected \$699. Current inspection: \$149; projected \$300.

Our thanks to everyone serving on the Property Committee and Work Team. The committee meets the Tuesday following the first Sunday of the month. Workdays are usually Tuesday and Thursday mornings. We always welcome additional help. Zion is a beautiful structure that takes lots of energy to maintain.

Let there be (new) lights

During the time all Zion worship services were held downstairs, the Mark Valentine and the Property Team converted the lighting in the Sanctuary to LEDs and modernized the lighting controls for the main floor. Mark says the new lights take 85% less power and provide a much brighter illumination. The lights are now controlled by modern dimmers. Mark also took the time to update many switches and outlets throughout the main floor of the church. Estimate are that Mark and his team saved the church about \$10,000 by doing the work

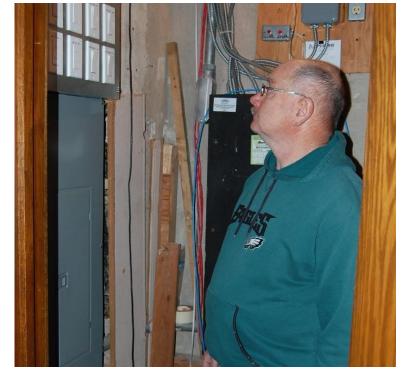

ENDOWMENT FUND 2021 REPORT

Zion Finance Committee Report 2021

Robert Jones, Chairperson; Steven Ristila, Vice-Chair; Dave Gensure, Treasurer; Ann Marie Hadesty, Financial Secretary; Pastor White; George Taylor; Walter Weston; Rochelle Evanousky; Matthew Warden and Council Member Sam Caley serve on Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church Finance Committee.

It was another rough year dealing with Covid and multiple issues with the church building. We ended last ahead of Budget by \$15,486.71 but this year ended with a deficit of \$3,928.94.

Included in Income:

Endowment Fund gave \$19,710 to pay the annual insurance premium. This fund has recently been tapped twice to pay for repairs. Once for \$24,425 and most recently for \$7,351.00. The Committee sees a dangerous trend that money to support the Church is now coming out of Endowment and not from giving and/or gifts. Finance thanks Endowment Committee for managing the Church's assets.

Wagner Estate. \$29,578.71 was carried over from 2020.

Culinary Crew. This past year again many of their activities were cancelled because of the pandemic but they were still able to turn \$5,200 over to the Church. We thank the Culinary Crew for all their dedication and hard work.

Thrift Store. The hard-working group behind this new ministry were able to raise \$11,648.93. Thank you for your efforts!

Thrivent. Many of our members have savings invested with this organization. All qualified members are eligible to apply for 2 Thrivent Action Team Projects per year. Thrivent gives a \$250 "Community Impact Card" which is a VISA card which may be used as seed money to purchase supplies. Both Culinary and Property have in the past had Action Teams to work on various projects and socials. In addition, Thrivent also has what is called "Choice Dollars". Eligible members can designate where Thrivent distributes a portion of its charitable money. The amount a person receives is based on their insurance premiums and contract values. As a result of this program Zion received \$430 last year. We thank all of our Thrivent members for what they have done to help the Church throughout the past year.

Boyer's and Redner's cards. The Church received \$441.16 from Boyers, and \$192,85 from Redners. Please remember to use these cards when shopping.

Amazon Smiles. The Church received \$160.47 from this program.

The people of Zion are blessed to have received so much but keep in mind without the financial contributions listed above we would not have been able to pay our bills. The weekly offerings and other income would not have been enough to cover our expenses.

We have a hard working, dedicated Finance Team and I thank everyone for all the effort they put into our work this past year. I especially want to thank Dave, Ann Marie and our Parish Administrator Melody for the exceptional work they do.

Zion's Capital Campaign (CC) Committee currently consists of eight members: Pastor Cindy, Sandy Mehalko, George Taylor, Bob and Gail Jones, Chris Henritzy and Darlene and Dave Fetterman. The committee began its works in April 2017. Due to the Covid pandemic the committee did not formally meet in 2020 or 2021. New committee members are always welcome. Committee members may include individuals who are not members of Zion. Anyone interested in serving on the committee is asked to contact Dave.

In 2021, the CC Committee is excited to report that it has received from Zion members and non-members \$57,650.25 in pledges, memorials and gifts. This amount includes 2% interest paid (\$5,091.67) on the loan from the Endowment Fund. The campaign committee's current fund balance is \$1,450.25. The committee is also very pleased to report two more leaves were added to Zion's Giving Tree in the Gathering Room. Thanks again to Chris Henritzy for his beautiful engravings.

Contributions received were made towards expenses incurred for the completion of Phase II of Zion's exterior restoration, including exterior parsonage repairs. Total restoration and repair costs for work performed by deGruchy and Romano totaled \$226,184.45. Phase II costs also included payment for the balance of Kirby-Smith consulting fees (\$7,495.00). As of January 1, 2022, there is an outstanding balance of \$46,000.00 on the loan from the Endowment Fund for Phase II of the project. Since April 2017, because of Zion members exceptional generosity and contributions from others, Zion's Capital Campaign raised approximately \$335,150.00 towards the restoration of the church's exterior.

<u>Classrooms:</u> Currently seeking matching individual school desks for each classroom to replace the folding tables. My hope is to find some that can be donated, or cheaply purchased. With school desks we will have more flexibility and control over socially distancing the children by giving each child their "own space". In addition, most school desks and chairs have adjustable legs which will allow us to better accommodate the children as they grow.

<u>Kids Fellowship Area:</u> After nearly two years of planning, the kids fellowship area was finally finished on God's Work Our Hands Sunday. The room was refreshed by an action team consisting of Michael Haspe, and the Lawfer Family. The children have been enjoying playing, and fellowship since the beginning of the Sunday School year. The Kids Fellowship Room replaces the vacant Nursery on the Sanctuary Level outside the Gathering Room. This concept is in response to the concerns that were voiced at a council meeting in 2019 regarding children's activities after church, and Sunday School. The room gives children a safe space for fellowship and play. Activities, crafts, toys, and games are still needed for older children.

Sunday School resumed in person instruction in September. The class is using a mix of Sparkhouse, Whirl, and traditional bible learning. The focus on "media" has been minimized this year, and Sunday School is being taught in a more classic approach. It was determined this would be the best way to conduct Sunday School this year given the fact the children are subjected to media, and digital learning on a daily basis at School. The classic approach is proving to do well, as information is being more easily retained by the students. Following a 45-minute class time the children are permitted to play in the kid's fellowship room downstairs.

4 Students were confirmed at the Pentecost 2021 service on May 23. As customary confirmation took a break for the summer months. Confirmation classes resumed in person instruction in September with 1 student being confirmed on Pentecost in 2022. The students are currently in Year A and working on Lutheranism 101, Reformation, and Luther's Small Catechism. Under the current 2-year period of instruction attendance has steadily declined is 2017. Most Lutheran Churches in the ELCA, have a 1-year (or less) period of instruction. Pastor Cindy and I are currently investigating new Confirmation curriculum in an effort to increase attendance for the 2022-2023 instruction year.

<u>First Holy Communion:</u> There were 5 children registered for First Holy Communion classes in 2021. 4 of the students have received first holy communion. 1 is eligible and will receive first Holy Communion in early 2022. The class is led by Pastor Cindy White & Michael Haspe.

Vacation Bible School: VBS returned to in person in 2021. 75 children were in attendance. We followed Cokesbury's 2021 program "Discovery on Adventure Island". The program left a positive impact on both the children that attended, as well as VBS volunteers. On Adventure Island explorers were on the hunt for Professor Luminari's 5 lost infinity lanterns with the messages and bible truths of Hope, Joy, Trust, Love, & Peace. Lighthouse Keeper Michael, and our puppet pal Beacon started and ended the daily assembly. The children had a very positive reaction to the puppet/person characters. After the assembly children rotated through Bible Explorations with Deb Davies, Crafts & Missions with Judy Brennan, Music with Beth Marcavage, and Ashley Heatter, and Reflection/Snack Time with Pastor Cindy. Several changes to VBS this year included mixed age group team of "island explorers which was a positive change. It was noticed the children were more focused, and the older explorers took on leadership, and helped younger explorers with tasks. The week finished out with a half lesson day, and the Adventure Island Luau party! At the Luau children sang songs, ate dinner together, and shared fellowship with Beacon, their families, children, and VBS staff. A huge thank you to all VBS volunteers, group leaders, and all who donated! The 2022 Theme is Cokesbury's Food Truck Party. Your continued support is appreciated. Donations to VBS and should be marked "Vacation Bible School".

<u>Cradle Roll:</u> The cradle roll files are being reviewed. I am currently seeking replacement material for dated items.

Adult Education at Zion: Adult Sunday School is still on hold. The goal is to have the program active in the fall of 2022.

<u>Tree of Remembrance:</u> The memorial tree returned to the Gathering Room for Christmas. Nancy Thompson organized the activity. Promotion of the tree, and signups for the free memorial ornaments will begin in August 2022 in hopes to continue to grow this project. The project is funded by a generous donation from the Former Advent Lutheran Church.

<u>Adult Education Outreach:</u> Services were held in July and on Christmas Eve 2021 at the Hometown Nursing & Rehabilitation Center. Due to the pandemic and nursing home restrictions regular service did not resume in 2021. It is hopeful that regular monthly services will resume in 2022
